

Why **Rio Grande City?**

io Grande City is a distinctive city, unique in its history as in its location along the US/Mexico border and serves as a gateway for travelers, tourists and business enterprise. Its location offers a direct and short route between Monterrey, Mexico and one of America's major distribution centers - Houston. Rio Grande City's port of entry average short wait times and upcoming warehousing and cold storage facility plans will reinforce our location for logistics and distribution.

Rio Grande offers easy access to major highways, international port of entries, rail lines, and is a short 40 miles from daily commercial flights at the McAllen-Miller International Airport.

Along several of these points of access sits approximately 27 acres of light industrial park land. It is part of a multimillion-dollar project to develop nearly 100 acres of idle land in a key location just minutes from the port of entry crossing in Rio Grande City.

Rio Grande City's largest commercial development project is underway with several businesses currently under construction with others to quickly follow. The Rio Grande Village commercial plaza is a 29-acre

development and will feature retail, office, lodging, etc. and we're excited for the economic opportunities it will bring to our city.

Another area of future growth north of Rio Grande City is the proposed start of State Loop 195. This 17.24mile loop will stretch west and create development opportunities along its route for both commercial and residential development projects looking for high visibility and high traffic.







A Little Market in a South Texas Border Town

Armando Peña Jr., Border Town Foods

From a very young age, Armando Peña Jr. grew up surrounded by business. Working at his father's Gulf Gas Station, located in Roma, Texas, he saw his entrepreneurial father work towards realizing his goal of opening up a grocery store. Slowly incorporating beverages and snacks in that small gasoline station, Amando Sr. eventually opened the Riverview Family Center in 1978.

This would serve as a jumping off point for Amando Jr. As he saw the grit and determination his father displayed in achieving this long-term goal, he would use what he learned while attending Texas A & I University and running his father's company for 28 years to lay the foundation of what would become a burgeoning empire of homegrown neighborhood markets in Starr County including two in Rio Grande City.

How important have good employees been to your success?

It's everything. Our stores are located in small towns, in small neighborhoods and it's the same customers coming in and out every week, every day, to shop. Our employees go out of their way to welcome and serve them. They get to know our customers by name thus, establishing relationships and that makes all the difference in the world.

Where do you see yourself and your business in 10 years? 20 years?

Geographically all of our stores are in a cluster, each one approximately a 10-minute drive from each other and that makes it easier to operate. However our goal is to open a least one new grocery store per year for the next 10 years and we plan to open in Zapata and Hidalgo County.

Becky Ramirez, Lino's Pharmacy

A little over 10 years ago, a new medical plaza was in construction in Rio Grande City and the owner of Lino's Pharmacy, Jesus Rios, was looking to open a second location. He knew the right person to take on the challenge.

A native of Roma, Becky Ramirez pursued a bachelor degree in pharmacy at the University of Texas in Austin. Upon graduation in 1995, she and her husband decided to return home to Starr County where she began her pharmacy career at Wal-Mart.

He contacted Becky and asked if she was interested in becoming a business partner and expand into Rio Grande City. The news and timing couldn't have been any better. After 10 years, Becky's career at Wal-Mart had been great, but it was time to move on and realize a lifelong dream of owning a pharmacy. In 2008, Lino's Pharmacy opened in Rio Grande City.

What has been your most satisfying experience?

As pharmacists, we do a lot more behind the counter than just fill prescriptions; we manage the health care of our patients. For example, we make certain there are no drug interactions or duplications and help by answering questions or concerns they may have. My patients put their trust in us when they come in seeking advice and

> knowing I am able to attend to their health care needs, even with a recommended over the counter medication, is a most satisfying experience.

What have been some challenges in running your business?

Being a small independent pharmacy is a challenge. We have to compete with chains and insurances that prefer big chains and mail orders. We offer that extra customer service and satisfaction. We do free home deliveries where we go out to our patients that don't have transportation means. We also utilize a program called Med Sync. This allows our patients to pick up their ongoing prescriptions once a month. Through a different pharmacy program, we do comprehensive medication reviews. Many of our patients are taking 9 or more medications and we want to follow up to make sure they are taking their medications correctly.

Barbecue Traditions in Rio Grande City

Mario and Santa Gonzalez, Starr BBQ

In 2009, Mario and Santa Gonzalez took over a small restaurant and fine-tuned their passion for barbecue, blending traditional North Texas flavor with Rio Grande Valley zest to create a flavor unique to Rio Grande City.

Mario worked as a wastewater treatment plant operator and Santa was an at-home provider. Finding themselves between careers, an opportunity arose that enabled them to take skills honed at backyard barbecues and open a business. In the beginning, Mario was master of the pit and Santa, a guru of cuisine and like the time it takes to smoke a side of brisket; their venture was a labor of love and patience.

Forward ten years, Santa is now pit master and orchestrates her kitchen staff with artistry and pragmatic attention to detail while Mario handles the day-to-day operations of the restaurant; radiating enthusiasm as he looks to expand the barbecue experience in Rio Grande City.

What do you do to keep your menu new and exciting?

We're open to incorporating new menu items if we feel they are a good addition to the restaurant. One example is our most popular item, the rattlesnake egg. It's not really an egg, but a stuffed jalapeno with our own signature spin to it. We named it after Rio High School's mascot, the rattlesnake, because when you bite into them, they bite back.

We all know service is key. How important is customer service in your restaurant?

My expectation is for everyone that walks into our restaurant to have the best experience possible. Our staff knows customer service is very important and to always, no matter what kind of day you are having; tend to our customers with a smile.

What advice would you give someone starting a career in the restaurant field?

Be confident and believe in what you are going to do. Don't be afraid of change. Change can be good. Change to make it better for your customers. Over time, your customer base may shift change and you have to be willing to adjust to your customers needs.


Age & Gender Distribution in Rio Grande City

Rio Grande City has fun for the entire family with several parks located throughout the city that offer playgrounds, covered basketball courts and enough space for the entire family to enjoy. The Skate Plaza at Basilio Villarreal Municipal Park is fun for both novice and advanced skaters with over 12,000 square feet of ramps, bowls, benches and urban elements such as rails and stairs. For those seeking more adventurous activities, visit the Fordyce Nature Trails for hiking and biking. Explore over 200 acres of native brush, rising slopes and lush meadows.

Birdwatchers can flock to Rio Grande City's Chachalaca Wildlife Refuge and Fordyce Nature Trails to see a variety of bird and butterfly species gather along the Rio Grande River. If fishing is your angle, you can try your luck with largemouth bass and channel catfish at one of the best freshwater fishing lakes in South Texas. Explore, fish and bird watch along the trails and lake shore at Falcon State Park.

Rio Grande City's historic sites and museums pay tribute to the unique history of this region. The Kelsey Bass Museum offers a glimpse into the people who braved the treacherous waters of the Rio Grande to create this once bustling river port. The


wine tasting, Britton Ave Christmas Tree Lighting and hop on Bessie III to explore downtown's back streets, hidden places and points of interest.



Rio Grande City "Exceptionally Livable"

According to AreaVibes.com, Rio Grande City was scored as "Exceptionally Livable" in the state of Texas.
